Peg's Ponderings: Hope Is Everything

In her book, *Why Are the Dandelions Weeds?*, Kathleen O'Connell Chesto tells a story of her visit to a church during a very painful and dark time in her life. Thinking she was alone in the old stone Gothic structure, she cried out loud to God, "All I want is the courage to go on. All I need is a *little hope*." However, an adult and small child had just entered the church as she made her desperate plea. As the two walked down the aisle the little one, no more than three, stopped at Kathleen's pew, put her small hand on Kathleen's arm and said, "I'm Hope."

Hope is *not* a little thing. Anyone who has ever experienced a sense of hopelessness knows this to be true. When hope is lost, what else is there? As the proverb says, *He who has hope has everything*.

When I worked with inmates at Plymouth County Correctional Facility, one day a young man in my class named Kurt said to me, "When I get lonely, I get depressed. When I get depressed, I do drugs. When I do drugs, I steal. When I steal, I go to jail." I responded to this description of his vicious cycle with, "What are you getting from this program?" And Kurt said, "Hope."

No, hope is *not* a little thing. Hope is everything. Without it, we are doomed. We need hope when we are up against what seem to be insurmountable odds. We need hope to go on.

Each of us walks through periods of darkness that threaten to overwhelm us with fear and discouragement. During these times we might wonder, "Will I ever get to the other side? Will I ever see dawn again?" What might keep hope alive when we experience such deep darkness?

For me personally, it's my *commitment* to finding the light. It's the attitude, "I cannot give up. I refuse to quit." I look for hope wherever I can find it – in inspiration from others who have survived terrible crises, in my own past victories over hurdles and in the belief *this too shall pass*. Even the explosion of spring life out of a barren winter earth offers me hope.

We do not have to succumb to darkness, nor do we have to make our way through it alone. It's best to hold hands in the dark and allow others to be at our side when the path gets too steep. Surrounded by love, we can be carried by these living vessels of hope.

Last, but not least, we can remember how loved we are by our faithful God and let that love inspire hope in us. As Scripture says, "I will call this to mind as my reason to have hope: The favors of the Lord are not exhausted, his mercies are not spent. They are renewed each morning, so great is God's faithfulness." Lamentations 3: 21-23
